## Speaker: Transmitting Native Languages to New Generations

### Kayla Begay, Assistant Professor, Native American Studies

What implications are there for researching and understanding language with all its grammatical and social contexts, and for transmitting the languages to new generations of speakers? While Hupa has several remaining first language speakers, Wailaki hasn't had first language speakers for over 50 years. These local languages are in danger of dying out unless new generations learn and use them. Professor Begay will discuss her work using documentation to revitalize the Hupa and Wailaki languages.

Devastating wildfires all over California caught our attention this

summer. We tend to have a false sense of security on the coast that it won't happen here; our local fire history shows us otherwise. To celebrate Fire Safety Week, the first week in October, we offer some suggestions from Tracy Katelman, **Registered Professional Forester**, ForEverGreen Forestry in Eureka.

The Humboldt County Fire Safe Council published Living with Wildfire in *Northwestern California*, available as an informative magazine or online from the Humboldt County Fire Safe Council, Cal Fire, or Six Rivers National Forest.

The Fire Safe Council released the *Public Review Draft of the Humboldt County* Community Wildfire Protection Plan (CWPP). Humboldt residents are encouraged to read it to learn about local wildfire issues. The CWPP will be available on the

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WASHINGTON — AAUW Chief Executive Officer Kimberly Churches released the following statement announcing AAUW's opposition to the confirmation of Judge Brett Kavanaugh to the U.S. Supreme Court:

"AAUW's expectation is that our next Supreme Court justice will support the fundamental rights of all individuals and understand that his or her decisions have a very real impact on the daily lives of women and their families. After careful review of Judge Brett Kavanaugh's available record, it is clear to us that he would not be that justice. Judge Kavanaugh's record shows that he is willing to do grave harm by undermining positions central to AAUW's mission, including upending employment and labor rights, opposing reproductive rights and access to health care, entangling public education and religion, and restricting voting rights. The Supreme Court is the arbiter of so many of the rights essential to women and girls, and if confirmed Judge Kavanaugh will have a say in those decisions for decades to come. Therefore, AAUW opposes Judge Kavanaugh's confirmation to the Supreme Court.

On the specifics of his available record, Judge Kavanaugh confirmation would put women's constitutional rights, including abortion, at risk. He has shown opposition to women's access to reproductive health care and contraception, seeking to delay a woman's access to an abortion, arguing in support of religious employers who obstruct their employees' access to contraceptive coverage, and calling into question protections of the Affordable Care Act.

Judge Kavanaugh has shown little support for workers' rights, including low-wage workers and workers of color. While on the bench, Judge Kavanaugh argued to weaken protections for race and age discrimination, as well as to narrow prohibitions against retaliation. He routinely argued to limit workers' rights to organize and to narrow the scope of our nation's labor laws. He has consistently sided with employers and against workers, refusing to support those who seek to improve workplace conditions and to protect those who have experienced discrimination.

While we continue to urge that Judge Kavanaugh's full record be released to the American public, his available record makes clear that he stands in opposition to the values and mission of AAUW. He is the wrong choice for the Supreme Court and for women and girls. Now more than ever we need a Supreme Court justice who is not beholden to ideology and will be an independent voice. The role the next justice will play in all of our lives is too important for anything less."

Please contact your elected representatives and let them know how you feel about this issue that will affect women and girls for many years to come.

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**Our September Speaker** Kayla Begay is an Assistant Professor at Humboldt State University in the Native American Studies Department. She is a current board member with the Advocates for Indigenous California Language Survival (AICLS). Begay is a Hoopa Valley Tribal member of Hupa, Karuk, and Yurok descent. She had always been interested in language, but it wasn't until her undergraduate studies at Stanford that she zeroed in on linguistics, earning a degree with honors as well as a minor in Native American Studies. Though she saw a connection between the disciplines, the programs weren't connected. "I kind of had to make my own path," she says.

She found a convergence of those disciplines at UC Berkeley's Linguistics Program, where she earned a master's degree and is currently finishing her dissertation for a doctorate, entitled "Topics in Wailaki Grammar." Berkeley is home to a program with a history of studying and archiving California indigenous languages – it's there that Begay found the crossover between Native American Studies and linguistics that she's brought to Humboldt State. http://www.tinyurl.com/y8na9v2x

"I feel responsible, not just to my language but to all California Native languages as well, so people have resources to learn them and they continue to maintain them," Begay says.
