## AAUW Re-entry Womens' Scholarships

Our Scholarship Committee is really pleased to have received more than 30 inquiries about our scholarships, with 21 students actually completing the application process. Upon review we narrowed our selection base down to those we felt best met the requirements of the scholarships, would benefit the most from a financial award and would also contribute to our community in the future. Needless to say, this was a difficult process as many were excellent candidates and a credit to the programs at Humboldt State University.

After in-person interviews by the Committee, five students were selected for awards and have been invited to attend our Dec. 4<sup>th</sup> membership meeting via Zoom so that we can present them to our members. A brief bio of each follows with the amount awarded to each student. Without the very generous support of our membership, it would not have been possible to recognize these outstanding women. We thank all of you who have made donations to our Scholarship fund and hope your continued generosity will enable us to continue this outreach in the future.

**Asia Anderson - \$2,000:** Asia is on track to complete her Bachelor's degree in Biochemistry in 2022 with a plan to work toward her PhD in the Biosciences and continue in research and teaching, with a goal of possibly returning to HSU as a professor. As a single mother returning to education after 20 years, she has a passion for learning which she shares with other students as an academic coach and STEM tutor in the Umoja Center at HSU while carrying a full academic schedule which includes ongoing research in the Biochemistry Dept.

**Juhi La Fuente - \$2,000:** Juhi has chosen to complete a Master's degree in the challenging field of Fisheries Biology (May, 2023), complementing her strong interest in the marine sciences with the intention of continuing her education as a research assistant in the Fisheries Dept. With previous experience as an AmeriCorp volunteer and working in community outreach and science education programs, Juhi has developed a strong desire "to ensure that the next generation of women and girls feel seen, encouraged and represented" in the field.

**Liesl Gustafson - \$1,000:** Having to overcome serious health and personal problems has not deterred Liesl from pushing to accomplish her goal of completing a Bachelor's degree in Botany with a minor in Ecological Restoration (May, 2022). Having graduated from HSU with a Fine Arts degree (2006) Liesl is a strong student with clear and substantial goals to work at protecting and improving our environment. Her future holds a desire to complete a Master's program, become a Master Gardener and continue in her goal of being a benefit to her community in whatever the future holds for her.

**Natalie Arroyo - \$1,000:** With all that Natalie does in her day-to-day life, we would possibly need to describe her as an over-achiever. Returning to school to complete an M.S. in Environmental Science and Management, she is also working part-time, serving as a Coast Guard Reserve Officer, is a member of the Eureka City Council and an instructor in the undergraduate Environmental Science and Management Department. Natalie's "dream is to continue a life of public service and to make well-informed decisions

about land, water, and natural resource management for the rest of her career”.

Julia Neuman. - \$1,000: Having acquired a BA in Fine Arts and Child Development in 2002 at HSU, Julia has worked as a Classroom Supervising Teacher at the HSU Children's Center, and a Mental Health Case Manager at the Humboldt Dept. of Health and Human Services. Her work with children has motivated her to return to school full time to achieve an MSW (2022) and then an LCSW so she can become a credentialed play therapist for the community. As part of her program, she is working (non-paid) as an Intern for the County while providing for the needs of her son.

Monday night we discussed our pick for October, *The Nightwatchman* by Louise Erdrich. We all liked the way the author was able to blend a real-life story with humor, magical realism, description of the Chippewa beliefs, the sex trade and the trauma inflicted on Indian children by the boarding school system. It looked back to the mid 1950s which was the "golden age" of white America but portrayed a bleak picture of poverty and living conditions of the tribe. The story focused on a group of native Americans, who got together to present their case to Congress to fight a proposed bill to "liberate" or do away with their tribal designation. This push was actually an attempted land grab and described the ongoing effort to exterminate and force the indoctrination of the native population. While the book at times was tough to read, the characters were wonderful. We all especially liked the tribe's relationship with nature.

Our pick for next month was any work by Abdulrazak Gurnah, the British-Zanzibarian author who recently was awarded the Nobel prize for literature. OK, now, the bad news. Apparently, his works are somewhat obscure, and some were out of print. Gina and I had no luck finding any titles at the local Eureka/ Arcata bookstores or the county library. On top of that, the "supply chain" problem has also caused a shortage of paper! While some of his books are on order, they won't be available until next year.
