Gail Saunders Development Council Member, Hospice of Humboldt

Ms. Saunders was raised in Trinidad by third generation Humboldt County parents who instilled in her the importance of giving back to one's community. She retired from her career in real estate management to focus on her



parents' failing health. Ms. Saunders has an extensive background volunteering in community organizations and has served on many boards, the most recent being Hospice of Humboldt, St. Joseph Foundation, St. Joseph Community Board and The Ingomar Club.

Ms. Saunders was an active member of the Foster Parent Association, leading her to adopt two children who had been placed in her care. Her interest in Hospice grew when both her parents passed in the care of Hospice, her father at home and her mother in the Ida Emmerson Hospice House. She was able to observe and experience first-hand the exceptional care and compassion that her parents received. Ms. Saunders serves on Hospice of Humboldt's Development Council helping create a community in which no one dies alone or afraid and all who grieve are comforted.

AAUW's Mission is to advance gender equity for women and girls through research, education, and advocacy. Women have voted in this country for 102 years. Great progress has been made in education and the workplace. This quote from the AAUW website is an example of the work that still needs to be done. "Women's economic security is under constant threat and, no matter how you measure it, the gender pay gap remains persistent and unacceptable. In a calculation of the latest data from the U.S. Census Bureau comparing full-time, year-round workers, women took home 83.7% of the pay that men did—a figure that is not statistically different from the pay gap in 2020. In addition, a more comprehensive calculation that compared everyone with earnings in 2021 (including part-time and seasonal workers) found that women were paid a shocking 77% of men's wages last year." For the first time there will be a Native American woman aboard a Space Craft.

Astronaut Nicole Aunapu Mann, of the Wailacki of the Round Valley Indian Tribes (Mendocino County), will be mission commander - responsible for all phases of flight. Ms Mann was selected to be in a pool of astronauts eligible for Nasa's Artemis program that will send humans to the Moon.

She will go to the International Space Station. "It's very exciting," she told newspaper Indian Country Today. "I think it's important that we communicate this to our community, so that other Native kids... realize that some of those barriers that used to be there are really starting to get broken down," she

Ms. Mann says that in her allocated 3.3 lb (1.4kg) for personal items she will take "a dreamcatcher that my mother gave me when I was very young". According to the Indigenous Foundation, <u>dreamcatchers</u> <u>symbolize unity</u> and provide protection.

Ms. Mann studied mechanical engineering at Stanford University. She become a colonel in the Marine Corps, flying various fighter aircraft. She has been deployed twice on aircraft carriers supporting combat operations in Iraq and Afghanistan, and was awarded six medals for her service to the US military.

Ms. Mann is one of eight members of the 21st Nasa astronaut class, formed for space station operations and potential future assignments to the Moon and Mars. <u>She will be joined by</u> astronaut and pilot Josh Cassada, astronaut Koichi Wakata from the Japan Aerospace Exploration Agency, and Russian cosmonaut Anna Kikina. 
