#### 2023 Tech Trek Camp Opportunity Provided to Six Students

Our AAUW-Humboldt branch sponsored SIX campers at the **2023 Tech Trek Camp** at Sonoma State University this summer. Tech Trek is a week-long camp for seventh grade girls, designed with the aim of encouraging girls to pursue science, technology, engineering and math (STEM) careers. And, wow, what a wonderful learning environment

it is. Chapter members Nancy Arroyo and Gina Rogers attended two days of camp, and came back so enthusiastic about what they saw. The students took workshops in robotics, soldering and building "jiggybots"; in astronomy, learning about lenses and the fabulous careers of many women scientists and engineers; in forensics, taking fingerprint readings; in microbiology, using microscopes and pipettes and petri dishes; and so much more.

These girls were nominated by their school's science teachers, and had tosubmit applications and write essays and complete an interview. Our Tech Trek Committee – Mary Lou Lowry, Nancy Arroyo, Gail Freeman, Marilyn Hagar, and Dorothy Skjonsby – interviewed each student and also provided ongoing orientation information to help the parents with the applications and logistics and getting comfortable sending their girls to camp.

Thanks so much to all our AAUW members who donated to Tech Trek this year. We raised

nearly \$5,000. You'll be hearing more about the campers' experiences in upcoming monthly meetings.

## Notebook Computers Awarded to Two Outstanding Continuing High School Graduates

Dorothy Skjonsby and Mary Lou Lowry coordinated the awarding of notebook computers to two Humboldt County high school students. These students were selected by their teachers for their outstanding high school performance and interest in continuing education.

Magaly Gema Orea graduated from East High School, Fortuna on May 26. The faculty at East High recognized Magaly as a hard-working student who is committed to community service and continuing her education after graduation. Teacher Jacey Spies noted that Magaly volunteered in the afternoon with the Life Skills classroom and is currently working hard to get her paraprofessional certification, with plans to go to school after graduation to become an elementary educator.

The other awardee, Shasta Kirby, recently earned her high school diploma from Eureka Adult School and intends to further her education at College of the Redwoods. She completed her diploma while working full time, caring for her family, and tending to her small farm of rescue animals. Her teacher Rebecca Twiss wrote that "Shasta is remarkable for her dedication, perseverance, and positivity. Her high level of engagement and ability to advocate for herself are strengths that will lead to success in all of her endeavors."

Our chapter has been offering an annual award to one or two outstanding female continuation high school students in the county for about 40 years now, starting out by awarding dictionaries but shifting to digital platforms as the times have changed, with this year's awardees each receiving a notebook computer.

#### **Public Policy**

Stronger California, a coalition partner of AAUW



California, has provided a social media toolkit for AB 524: The Family Caregiver Anti-Discrimination Act.

AB 524 is one of the bills that AAUW California is supporting. This bill will prohibit employment discrimination on account of family caregiver status, as well as recognize the opportunity to seek, obtain, and hold employment without discrimination because of family caregiver status as a civil right. AB 524 is

currently in the Suspense File, and on September 1 the Suspense File hearing will announce whether it will advance to the Senate Floor.

Take action on AB 524 now:

1. Ask your branch members and your network to urge their State Senators to vote Yes on AB 524. They can very easily do this by going to <u>https://actnow.io/Q20xkgM</u> and completing the form. An email to their State Senator will be automatically generated.

Family caregiver discrimination occurs when an employer takes a negative employment action (firing, demotions, etc.) against an employee based on their status as a caregiver.

Working mothers, pregnant people, low-wage and LCBTQ+ workers, and people of color are disproportionately impacted by caregiver discrimination. Family Caregiver Anti-Discrimination Act? AB 524 would protect California family caregivers by ensuring that employers cannot discriminate against them at work.

What is AB 524.

What is family caregiving? A family caregiver is anyone who provides care for a loved one – be it friends or family. People of color have disproportionately been more likely to become caregivers in recent years.
